Course Description

This course aims to explore the whole continuum of dispute resolution methods and techniques which may be a replacement for civil litigation, such as negotiations, mediation and conciliation (with a number of intermediary forms) and arbitration. The students will be acquainted with the general theory of non-judicial dispute resolution as an alternative to the proceedings within the institutions of the state justice system, and will learn their main characteristics and special features of the individual methods of alternative dispute resolution (ADR). In the course the students will have an opportunity to analyze and interpret the law of arbitration and mediation at a national level (e.g. Croatian law and the law in the region). However, special attention is also devoted to new trends related to the use of ADR at a European and international level.

Course Description

In the introduction to the course the international sources of anti-discrimination law as well as the sources of anti-discrimination law of the Council of Europe are explained. However, the focus of the course is on the understanding of concepts of equality and non-discrimination in the EU law. Therefore, the course deals with the following topics: Development of EU law and policy on equality; The Key Terms (Direct discrimination; Indirect discrimination; Harassment; Sexual Harassment; Justifications, Formal and Substantive Equality, etc.); Non-discrimination on prohibited grounds (race, gender, sexual orientation, religion and belief, disability, age); Remedies; Family friendly policies; Equal treatment in social security; Discrimination in Digital Era (AI and Discrimination).

Course Description

The course examines bioethical problems that are of relevance to legal field and, by bringing these problems in relation to human rights, it involves analysis of the development of moral and bioethical argument about the development of health law in particular countries, regions and the world. The course begins with an overview of the health system and its constitutional and legislative framework. Emphasis is placed on the concepts of the right to health, pandemics/epidemics, medical ethics, patients' rights and efficiency and safety in health care, AI, abortion, euthanasia, organ traffickings, gene manipulation etc. While dealing with different topics, the major task of the course is to learn to apply the bioethical theories to practical cases. In the same vain, to critically analyse the role of international organizations, states, legal entities and individuals concerning the right to health and the access to healthcare.

Course Description

National civil procedural law, both at the legislative level as well as in application in courts, has been widely influenced by the case law of the European Court of Human Rights (ECtHR) and the Court of Justice of the European Union (CJEU). However, it is not always easy to assess whether the decisions of those courts also apply to domestic civil procedural rules, especially if the national law concerned in the rulings of the Court in Strasbourg and the CJEU is (somewhat) different from domestic law. Therefore, it seems appropriate to offer a course in which students could deepen their knowledge and competences acquired during legal studies, especially in the courses on civil procedure, EU law, constitutional law, and criminal procedure. Critical reading of selected decisions of the Court in Strasbourg and the CJEU will additionally train students for their proper understanding and independent critical reading. This will also raise awareness of the importance of regular monitoring of the case law of the European Court of Human Rights and the CJEU in order to properly apply the national rules of civil procedure.

Course Description

Comparative Criminal Law is a field of study that examines criminal law systems across different countries and jurisdictions, and compares their approaches to crime and punishment. This course provides an in-depth exploration of the principles and practices of criminal law in various legal systems, with a special focus on the United States and Europe. Throughout the course, students will analyze and compare the key concepts of criminal law, such as the elements of a crime, the criminal liability of individuals and organizations, and the different types of punishments and sentencing schemes. They will also examine the various legal and cultural factors that shape criminal law systems, such as historical and political contexts, cultural values and norms, and the role of the judiciary and law enforcement agencies. By the end of the course, students will have a comprehensive understanding of the similarities and differences between criminal law systems in different countries, and be able to critically evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of different approaches to criminal justice. They will also develop skills in legal analysis, comparative research, and critical thinking, which will be valuable for a range of careers in law, public policy, and international affairs.

Course Description

This course is primarily developed for foreign students who participate in the ERASMUS exchange programme. Students of the Faculty of law of the University of Zagreb can as well enrol the course as an elective subject within the 9th semester of Master of law study. After successfully finishing the course students are expected to gain a general knowledge on the consumer protection law in the European Union, notably its main features, sources of law, regulation techniques and specific provisions. They should be able to enumerate main rights of consumers, main sources of law of consumer protection, fields of protection and main features of consumer protection regulation. Furthermore, students are expected to be able to detect different modalities of judicial and alterative protection of consumer rights. Finally, after successfully finishing the course students are expected to acquire specific knowledge which will help them in solving practical problems.

Course Description

The course looks into the competences of the European Union in the area of criminal law. For a long time, criminal law has been considered an issue which falls within the exclusive competence of the Member States of the EU. However, during the historical development of the European integration process, it became obvious that it is necessary for the EU to have competences in the area of criminal law, if it wants to ensure effective application of its policies in matters which fall within its competence. The course looks at the current competences of the EU in the area of criminal law, with particular focus on judicial cooperation in criminal matters, harmonization of national criminal laws and EU institutions established in the area.

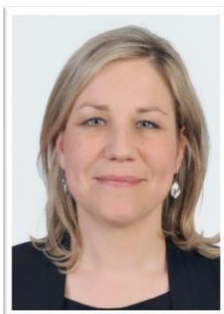

Course Description

This course examines the origins and development of European integration since the turn of the 20th century. The first section of the course considers the antecedents of integration before 1914 and in the Interwar period. It provides a comparative basis for the second part, which focuses on the decade between the Marshall Plan and the Treaties of Rome. The final part of the course deals with the European Communities from their foundation until the Treaty of Maastricht and the evolution and role of the European Union law and institutions in the European Integration process. Through examining the key moments in the political and institutional development of European integration, students will gain a comprehensive and systematic understanding of the history of the EU and better insight into contemporary political and economic relations in Europe, the EU legal system and the process of decision making in the European Union.

Course Description

Introduction to key theories, concepts, tools of economic analysis of law, as well as investigation into their relevance to contemporary social and legal issues, by examining the key components of national and international legal systems, with the focus on differences between American and European approach to the same issues. Although certain important and rather complex economic issues are discussed during the course, it does not require a background in economics. Rather, the course aims to help in understanding the nature of the relationship between the law and the economics in the evolution of contemporary legal systems. The course is built with a balance of historical and theoretical approaches in the study of practical issues, such as transaction costs, externalities, competition, game theory, welfare state and public choice theory.

The aims of this course are:

To examine critically and to give students an insight into the methods and tools of economic analysis of law by which it could assess the impact of the legal system to the economic well-being of individual members of society, as well as the community as a whole, with special emphasis on the sources and the effectiveness of the application of law in countries in transition. Finally, in addition to transmitting knowledge, the goal is to develop students' capacity for analytical thinking and problem-solving approach to research the effects of legal norms and the award and provide them with the theoretical tools to help them assess their economic efficiency and impact.

the EU and Republic of Croatia - basic principles, terms, regulation of technical foundations for broadcasting of electronic media (frequencies, IPTV, universal access, interconnections), 5. Digital dividend and net neutrality - influence on regulation of electronic media services, 6. Regulatory framework for electronic media - comparative analysis of EU and Croatian legislation, 7. Audiovisual media services (linear services) and audiovisual media services on demand (non-linear services), different tiers of rules, 8. Topics from civil, criminal and international law are discussed. The knowledge of English law of contract and related terminology is applied in the analysis of *Carlyll v. Carbolic Smoke Ball Co.* English criminal law and terminology is outlined in the analysis of ECHR judgment *Tyrer v UK*. International law and terminology is outlined in the analysis of *The Rainbow Warrior*. Various judgments of the ECHR are analyzed. The focus is on legal terminology, written and oral communication skills and understanding the structure and style of legal texts. Different reading strategies are acquired.

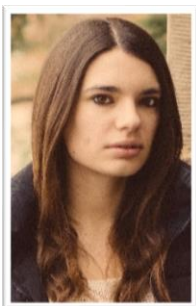

Course Description

This course is aimed at students interested in exploring climate change governance in the European Union and its influence on global standard setting. It covers a broad range of topics which are crucial for understanding the current climate change regime – the scientific basis for regulation, the actors responsible for the development of climate change legislation in the EU, the EU legislative framework with the special focus on the Emission Trading Scheme, the European Green Deal, the proposed Border Carbon Adjustment mechanism and the renewable energy policy, as well as the EU's role in global climate change governance and the impact of climate change on migration. The course will strive to improve students' problem identification and solving skills in an environment which fosters critical debate. Having taken the course, the students will be able to identify and assess the development of climate change law and policy in the EU.

Course Description

The course aims to examine the constitutional structure of the European Union, its gradual development through the European integration and the crucial role of the Court of Justice of the EU within that process. Its interactive lectures based on a case-study method will examine the EU's most intriguing constitutional features, such as the principles of

direct effect and supremacy; the EU's supranationality and EU federalism; balancing the expansion of EU competences with the retained competences of the Member States; the use of general principles of EU law in CJEU's judicial lawmaking; or EU fundamental rights protection and EU citizenship beyond the market rationale. The course will critically engage with these interesting features of EU law, as well as the complexities arising out of the Union's unique supranationality and its (contested) federal and constitutional nature. By emphasizing the necessity of a methodological approach to the law, the course will lead students to understand the importance of legal interpretation, in general, and engage with the constitutional methods of legal reasoning employed by the Court of Justice when interpreting EU law, in particular.

The course creates interest in EU gender equality and addresses the issue of its (in)adequate implementation at national level. Law students and lawyers represent important facilitators for the successful implementation of the EU gender equality law and policy. There is a need to increase the number of lawyers dealing with gender discrimination issues in legal profession and public administration, as well as prepare them for strategic litigation in front of national courts and active role in preliminary ruling procedure in front of the Court of Justice of the EU.

Course Description

The aim of the course European Fiscal Law is to introduce students who have previous knowledge in tax/fiscal law with rules and concepts of European tax and budget law as well as with the sources of funding of the EU and modalities of funds allocation. The students will learn about the rules on harmonization of tax systems with the emphasis on the differences between harmonizing direct and indirect taxes. Harmonized rules on VAT, excise duties as well as corporate income taxation will be discussed. The students will be presented with the overview of EU rules against tax evasion and tax avoidance as well as the EU efforts in fighting tax havens, rules on administrative cooperation and mutual agreement procedures. Some of the most important ECJ judgements in European tax law cases will be analyzed. Apart from the tax topics, the EU Budget is also an important part of the course syllabus. The students will be introduced to the sources of EU's own revenues as well as features and structure of the EU budget and purposes for which the funds may be allocated. Furthermore, the most important EU fiscal rules will be discussed. After covering the most important tax and budget topics, the effects of the European legislation on the Croatian tax and budget system as well as on tax and budget systems of selected EU Member States will be analyzed.

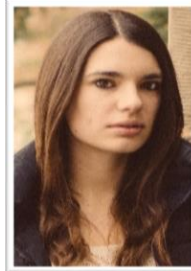

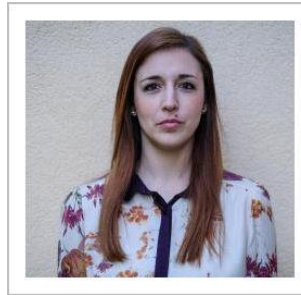

Course Description

Private law, as a branch of law governing the legal status and mutual relations of free and equal individuals, is an extremely important area of harmonization of the laws of the Member States of the European Union. The aim of the course is to introduce all students to the specifics of private law in the European Union. During the course, special emphasis shall be placed on the application of EU law in the area of private law relationships and thereto-related contentious issues arising in harmonization of national private law with EU law. The course deals with those areas of private law, which are particularly developed by the EU law, such as contract law, copyright, liability for damages, consumer contract law, remedies, etc. Furthermore, particular emphasis is placed on the function of private law for the development of the digital market by addressing topics related to electronic formation of contracts, blockchain technology, use of platforms for formation of contracts, etc. The course will prepare you to master the terminology used in EU private law, it shall familiarize you with the legal sources of EU private law, the specific principles of EU private law, the case law of the Court of Justice, and it shall help you understand the process of harmonization of European law as well as current problems in harmonization.

Course Description

This elective course is structured as a follow-up course, the fifth course, after having attended four mandatory courses of German language of law in the first and second year of studies. However, the course is open for all other interested domestic and Erasmus students, whose general knowledge of German language is at least on the level B2. Starting from basic knowledge about legal systems in German speaking countries and from key legal terms in German, the aim of the course is to provide students with the opportunity of analysing original legal documents in the German language, such as contracts, cases, laws and other regulations. Through the analysis of authentic text students gain an insight into their structure, style and use in the context of different legal businesses.

Working on such authentic sources, students expand their knowledge of different fields of law, such as: contract law, copyright law, company law and European law. The following topics are discussed within the course: founding a

limited liability company in German and Croatian legal system, based on the authentic document of articles of association in German. The discussion about copyright law starts from an authentic contract regulating rights of translation, and it also includes potential violations of copyright law in the field of music and photography. The source for the work on an authentic piece of legislation is German civil code (Bürgerliches Gesetzbuch - BGB), which is used for short translation exercises and for interpretation of single provisions. Analysis of judgements of the Court of Justice of European Union enables the comparison of different versions of the same authentic document in German, Croatian and English. When Erasmus students take part in the course there is a wonderful possibility for a direct exchange of experience and for the comparison of entire legal systems as well as specific legal institutes. The obligation of the students is to regularly attend classes and to prepare for active participation based on provided materials. The concluding assignment is to prepare an individual paper, supported by a power-point presentation and a handout with the main elements of the chosen legal topic for other course participants.

In this course participants will gain an overview of the main schools of economic thought from the middle ages till the present day, as well as the most important cultural, political and legal impacts that they have had on the society at large. Introduction to key economic theories, concepts and ideas, as well as investigation into their relevance to contemporary social and political issues on a local, national and global scale, by examining the key components of national and international economic systems. Although certain basic and important economic issues are discussed during the course, it does not require a background in economics. Rather, the course aims to help students in their first contact with economic theory and doctrines to understand the main principles of economics and evolution of contemporary economic systems. Economics evolved through a long process in which various thinkers through the dialogue with the works of their predecessors and their contemporaries with the aim to provide answers for pressing problems of society. This course emphasizes the historical context as well as the analytical contents of those theories, the evolution of economic thought and changing perspectives on the role of markets and the state in the economy. The course is built with a balance of historical and theoretical approaches in the study of practical issues.

Course Description

The automation of driving on roads and navigation in air and at sea is steadily becoming a reality in everyday life. The technology of automatizing dynamic control over a specific vehicle has been in development for many decades, the most advanced instances of such technology being visible in air and at the sea. The Law of Autonomous Vehicles is experiencing exponential growth and development. The International Maritime Organization is developing a code for maritime autonomous surface ships. Various jurisdictions have developed complex legislation related to the operation of unmanned aerial vehicles, and the European Union has prepared a package of legal instruments concerning the operation of unmanned aerial vehicles and their access to the market. In the road sector, the Society of Automobile Engineers and UNECE have developed specialized standards and regulation, whereas certain jurisdictions, such as numerous federal states in the United States of America and several other developed countries (such as United Kingdom, France, Germany, Israel, Singapore, South Korea, and others) have enacted specialized laws concerning the use of advanced algorithms for driving assistance and semi-autonomous driving systems. The course will analyze the noted legal developments in depth, and provide wider outlook concerning the inter-connected issues such as the pending regulation of artificial intelligence utilized in the transport sector, insurance models that are capable of adhering to the particularities of autonomous vehicles, market-impact that the introduction of such technology brings, protection of data analyzed by the autonomous driving/navigation systems, and future projections regarding the impact of autonomous driving/navigation technology on transport policy and transport services.

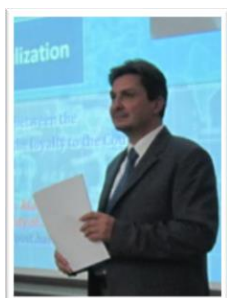

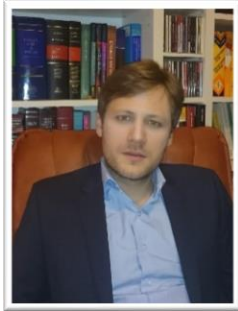

The issue of security, traditionally under direct control and responsibility of states, came under severe scrutiny during the last two decades, due to, among other factors, a constant increase in private actors' engagement in providing security services in the private as well as public domain, often within a public private partnership structure.

The purpose of the course is to provide students with the understanding of principal concepts with regard the term security in the modern setting. The course will examine the national law experience in regulating the private security services, with special focus on the issues of licensing, registration, control, accountability, transparency and standards performance. The course will further analyses the civil and criminal responsibility of security service providers in comparison with public security service providers. Parallel to the national law regulation, the course will additionally examine both the international regulatory framework, as well as the self-regulation efforts made by the industry, inter-governmental and non-governmental organizations. A special focus will be devoted to the operation of private military and security companies in accordance with the International Law of Armed Conflict. Finally, the course will analyze current trends in the private security industry, such as is the provision of maritime security services, airport security services, cyber security services, policing services and services connected to the protection of critical infrastructure.

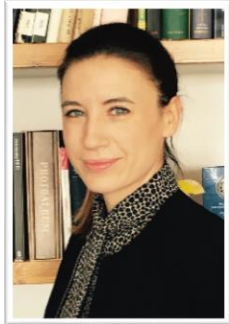

Course Description

The course will provide an overview of the institutes of Roman private law as a foundation of the civil law systems. It will give the students the opportunity to learn and understand how, under which external and internal influences, different institutions, concepts and principles of private law were developed during the Roman legal history. It will be first presented the historical framework and the sources through which the law was created. Afterwards, according to the Gaius' tripartition, the basic notions of status law and family law will be studied. This will be followed with the analysis of property law and the law of obligations. In the latter, the focus will be on the individual sources of obligations, especially contracts, whereby, based on the exegesis of the primary sources, students will be given an insight in the modes of legal argumentation of Roman jurists. In the end, it will be given an overview of general principles and institutes of the law of inheritance and the Roman civil procedure. Providing the background, legal logic and arguments used in the development of Roman private law, the course should also enable students to better understand and critically evaluate the institutes of contemporary private law.

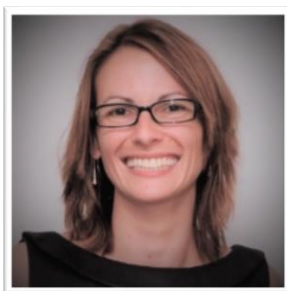

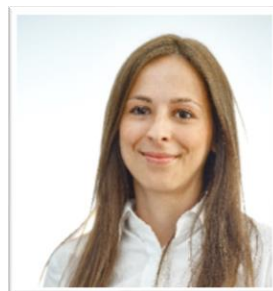

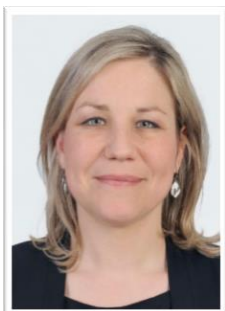

Rather, the course aims to help in understanding the nature of the relationship between the law and the economics in the evolution of contemporary legal systems. The course is built with a balance of historical and theoretical approaches in the study of practical issues, such as transaction costs, externalities, competition, game theory, welfare state and public choice theory.

To examine critically and to give students an insight into the methods and tools of economic analysis of law by which it could assess the impact of the legal system to the economic well-being of individual members of society, as well as the community as a whole, with special emphasis on the sources and the effectiveness of the application of law in countries in transition. Finally, in addition to transmitting knowledge, the goal is to develop students' capacity for analytical thinking and problem-solving approach to research the effects of legal norms and the award and provide them with the theoretical tools to help them assess their economic efficiency and impact.

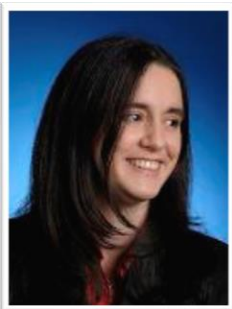

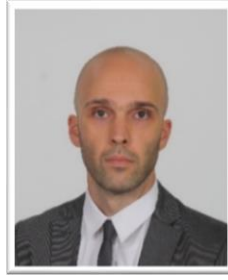

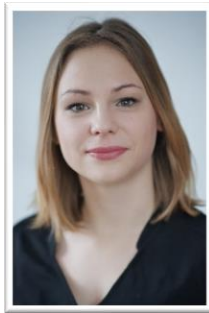

The automation of driving on roads and navigation in air and at sea is steadily becoming a reality in everyday life. The technology of automatizing dynamic control over a specific vehicle has been in development for many decades, the most advanced instances of such technology being visible in air and at the sea. The Law of Autonomous Vehicles is experiencing exponential growth and development. The International Maritime Organization is developing a code for

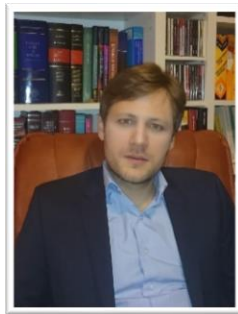
maritime autonomous surface ships. Various jurisdictions have developed complex legislation related to the operation of unmanned aerial vehicles, and the European Union has prepared a package of legal instruments concerning the operation of unmanned aerial vehicles and their access to the market. In the road sector, the Society of Automobile Engineers and UNECE have developed specialized standards and regulation, whereas certain jurisdictions, such as numerous federal states in the United States of America and several other developed countries (such as United Kingdom, France, Germany, Israel, Singapore, South Korea, and others) have enacted specialized laws concerning the use of advanced algorithms for driving assistance and semi-autonomous driving systems. The course will analyze the noted legal developments in depth, and provide wider outlook concerning the inter-connected issues such as the pending regulation of artificial intelligence utilized in the transport sector, insurance models that are capable of adhering to the particularities of autonomous vehicles, market-impact that the introduction of such technology brings, protection of data analyzed by the autonomous driving/navigation systems, and future projections regarding the impact of autonomous driving/navigation technology on transport policy and transport services.

Throughout this course the students will be able to: 1) explain contemporary challenges for the protection of privacy and personal data protection in electronic communications as well as in the modern digital networked environment in general; 2) explain the logic and dynamics of the development of mentioned regulation at the domestic, EU and international level; 3) apply relevant sources of law to various problem situations with an impact on the right to privacy and data protection in the modern digital environment; 4) analyze the relevant CJEU and ECtHR case law; 5) evaluate proposals of the EU normative framework in the area; 6) draft professional legal opinions on the most recent concerns in the area.

Course Description

The course will provide an overview of the institutes of Roman private law as a foundation of the civil law systems. It will give the students the opportunity to learn and understand how, under which external and internal influences, different institutions, concepts and principles of private law were developed during the Roman legal history. It will be first presented the historical framework and the sources through which the law was created. Afterwards, according to the Gaius' tripartition, the basic notions of status law and family law will be studied. This will be followed with the analysis of property law and the law of obligations. In the latter, the focus will be on the individual sources of obligations, especially contracts, whereby, based on the exegesis of the primary sources, students will be given an insight in the modes of legal argumentation of Roman jurists. In the end, it will be given an overview of general principles and institutes of the law of inheritance and the Roman civil procedure. Providing the background, legal logic and arguments used in the development of Roman private law, the course should also enable students to better understand and critically evaluate the institutes of contemporary private law.

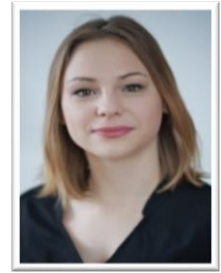

The elective course Contemporary approaches in the integration of science and practice of social work has an aim to introduce students to science-based models of social work practice and to encourage students to apply contemporary methodology for practice-based research. The course is opened to students that have at least basic knowledge in field of reserach methodology. The course is opened for social work students, but also those outside social work that are intersted in applied and engaged reserach or want to be familiarized with logics of evidence- based practice.
